SCENT GLANDS IN DEER 1998

The following is an extract from an article written by Dr. Tony English - Veterinary Aspects of Farming Deer in New South Wales. The Article was printed in Proceedings No. 49. Deer Refresher Course, 14-15 September 1979 and has been reproduced with his kind permission.

Deer have a number of scent glands, occurring in both sexes. These are the interdigital, the metatarsal and the preorbital (suborbital) glands, which are all paired. In addition, male deer have further glands in the sheath (Chapman and Chapman, 1975).

"Implications and recommendations. Australian deer farms need to improve reproductive efficiency for the industry to compete internationally. The comparative weaning rate in a recent New Zealand study was 83.6% with a minimum calf mortality rate of 2.3%."
